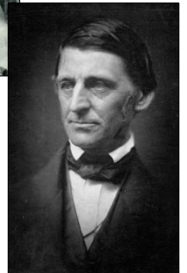
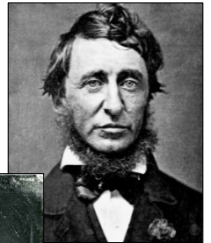
July 12-25, 2015
